Course Description: This course is the second in a two-part series. In BIOL 2252 we will survey human anatomy and physiological principles with emphasis on the following systems: endocrine, circulatory, lymphatic, respiratory, digestive renal and reproductive. In each system, we will cover the basic structure and function of the components.

Pre-Requisite: Biology 2251, Anatomy & Physiology I

Attendance: MANDATORY! Please note: 1) I do not keep track of attendance. Irresponsible students who do not choose to attend WILL do poorly. 2) Disruptive students will be asked to leave. 3) **NO** electronics or associated earpieces are allowed in **lecture or laboratory**. Interacting with cellphones or other electronics during a quiz or exam will be treated as an instance of **CHEATING**. 4) Those wishing to use laptop computers as part of the class are required to sit in the first row of the classroom. Viewing anything other than BIOL 2652 coursework on a computer during course time is prohibited. Any of these violations may result in the loss of one **LETTER GRADE** from your final grade. Students missing 20% of the lectures will receive a grade of “F” **regardless** of standing.

Assessment: The lecture grade (65%) is composed of five exams. There is an optional comprehensive final exam that can replace the lowest of the five exams. Questions will be based on notes that you take and material presented in lecture. Any questions

concerning grading should be brought to Dr. Uyeno's attention **NO LATER** than one week following return of the exam. Weekly WileyPLUS quizzes will be assigned online and will count as 8% of your final grade. Each person is required to have WileyPLUS access and will be expected to routinely monitor their course calendar for assignments. **NO make-up quizzes will be given for any reason.** I reserve the right to give unannounced quizzes to ensure that everyone is on time, attending class, and keeping up with lecture material. Make-up exams must have a documented excuse and should be scheduled before the exam date. No make-up exam will be given after one week from the regular exam date. Should you miss an exam without a documented excuse, you may take the comprehensive final to replace the missed exam grade.

The laboratory grade (27%) will be composed of three lab practical exams and a series of very short lab reports (for extra credit). The **Lab practicals cannot be made up. If a lab practical is missed, you will receive a zero for that lab grade.**

The final grade will be a combination of your final lecture score, laboratory score and WileyPLUS quizzes as noted below. The lecture final will be comprehensive and **OPTIONAL**. For those wishing to better their grade, this exam score will replace the lowest written exam score received during the semester.
