Literature Reading List

For each title, record this information:

Author; Title; Place of Publication; Publisher; Date of Publication; Brief Description; Recommended Grade or Age Level; Suggested Uses.

As an option, also record other information that you expect to find helpful. Accererated Reader level might be an example. (If you don't know what AR is, you will at the end of the term .

You may record this information in whatever manner you wish, provided that it can be transmitted electronically. Word processing documents, data base documents, and Web pages have been used in the past.

One reason we are recording this information: if your principal or director ever walks in and says, "You can have more money if you can get it spent by Friday." I want you to have a "wish list" ready to use. Keeping this in mind may help you decide what information to record and what format to use.

"Double dipping" is not allowed, which means that the same item can't count for more than one category. The exception to this is that in the Videos/CDs/Websites category, titles may duplicate but may not replace titles in other categories.

"Talking book" versions of the titles are fine, provided that they are unabridged.
